The occasion: The first German ad! The subject: Drastic changes in the weather.


The people: German-speaking Swiss in Zurich.

The first ad—a whopping 191/2 x 13 inches, one full page spread-appeared in Zürcher Woche (Zurich Week) on December 5, 1965, which has a circulation of 33,000. Over 70 replies have

The rest of the year in the broad-

casting field proved just as impressive. In the year 1965 the radio station lineup increased by more than 25 stations. From our own Radio Studio comes the fact that the wattage of radio power had increased by more than five million watts.

With a back look to the January 1965 edition of The PLAIN TRUTH can be found subscription figures totalling 545,000 copies. Now take a look at the December 1965 figures-a whopping 675,000 copies-an increase of more than 10,000 copies per month.


